There is a separate update on the Golden Jubilee Equestrian Statue Project. It is most heartening to see the level of donations from the Monarchist League both within and outside of the province. If you have not yet sent in a donation it is not too late to do so. Another article appears about a Golden Jubilee Rose Garden being created in Moose Jaw, under the guidance of John & Heather Morris, branch members from Moose Jaw.

GOLDEN JUBILEE EQUESTRIAN STATUE OF THE QUEEN

This unique Saskatchewan project honours the Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of Canada. The larger than life bronze statue is being created by well known Saskatchewan sculptor, Susan Velder. Her Majesty is seated on her favourite RCMP horse, Burmese, born and raised at Fort Walsh, Saskatchewan. Burmese was Her Majesty's favourite horse ridden in the Annual Trooping of the Colour ceremonies in London, England, from 1967 until he was retired in 1987 The completed statue will now be located at the head of the floral gardens in front of the Legislature in Regina, set in a beautiful small garden area of its own, designed to complement the Prince of Wales Entrance to the Cumberland Gallery. HRH Prince Edward will turn the sod for the statue's location on Thursday, 19 June at 10:30am.in the Legislature grounds.

The total cost of the project will be about \$300,000 and public subscriptions are being sought for a target of about \$250,000. The community of Maple Creek is an excellent example of a response to the project. They are raising \$10,000 which will enable them to own a miniature of the statue for their community. 15 miniatures are being produced and are being purchased by town and city councils and some companies and individuals. In May, 2004, a gala evening is planned in Regina on the general theme of "A Night At The Races". So far approximately \$115,000 has been raised towards the project. The Monarchist League in Saskatchewan and elsewhere has contributed \$5,300 of that amount at this time.

Because the completion and unveiling of the Statue is delayed until the Spring of 2004 it is still possible to make a donation of \$10 or more which will receive a tax receipt. Donations should be sent to The South Saskatchewan Community Foundation, 2300 - 11th Avenue, Regina, Sk., S4P 0K1. Cheques should be marked "Queen's Statue Project" on the front. Please remember to mention that you are a member of the Monarchist League. Our donations are being monitored by the project's treasurer.

NEWS AND NOTES

Annual Meeting of the Saskatchewan Branch

The annual meeting of the Saskatchewan Branch took place at St. Mary's Anglican Church, Regina, on January 24, 2003. The Chairman, the Rev. Derek Nicholls, welcomed those who came, conveyed regrets from some who were unable to attend, and led in a remembrance for members who had died.

The annual meeting included the presentation and discussion of annual reports, election of the members of the Board, and announcements of coming events, including the programs of future meetings of the branch. The evening concluded with the showing of a video on visits of the Queen Mother to Canada after 1952. Also, there was a social time and refreshments.

Report of the Chairman of the Saskatchewan Branch.

The Rev. Derek Nicholls noted in his annual report the increase of new members and the successful Jubilee events. These included the special service and dinner in February, the luncheon in May and the city Jubilee event in June. He expressed the Branch's appreciation to the Lieutenant-Governor for her attendance at and support of special events.

The report noted members of the Monarchist League in Saskatchewan who had received the Golden Jubilee Medal. These included Derek Nicholls, Isabel Bailey, both of whom also received the Silver Service Badge, Mrs. Joyce Johnson, Mrs Jacqueline

Schumiatcher, Dr. Michael Jackson, Mrs. Irene White, and Mr. Keith Inches.

The Saskatchewan Branch is in the process of developing its own website with the help of Will Chabun. The internet is important in attracting new members, and membership recruitment remains an important concern. The branch also is involved in preparing an entry for the new Saskatchewan Encyclopaedia.

Derek Nicholls thanked the members of the Board for their work and support, Isabel Bailey and Alison Fraser for their assistance with special social events, and Jessie Bailey and Lyle Harms for preparations at St. Mary's Church hall for the meetings.

THE CANADIANIZED MONARCHY

Notes of the talk given by Prof. David Smith to the meeting on March 21, 2003

Professor David Smith noted that he wrote his book, The Invisible Crown: The first Principle of Canadian Government, to provide an analysis of the Crown as an institution. While Canada has various features that are like a republic, features of the Canadianized Crown make Canada distinct. The federal government is as it is because of the Monarchy.

The first thing to notice about Canada's monarchy is that unlike Britain's it is derivative. Like the monarchies of Australia and New Zealand, it exists in a vacuum absent an established church or aristocracy to provide social context.

Monarchy has been and remains important for Canadian politics. The rest of the talk will illustrate the influence monarchy has on the way we govern ourselves.

First, there is the reserve power. Under our monarchical form of government, the Crown is much more than an executive. It has been useful in Canada for governments to emphasize the ceremonial function of the Governorgeneral and to diminish everything else. But everything else is important! The governor-general may only rarely use prerogative powers the Crown possesses. But those prerogative powers are extensive..

Second, Canada is a federation. There are at least eleven Crowns in Canada; I have argued in <u>The Invisible Crown</u> that it was the development of monarchy in the Canadian provinces

after 1867 that expanded and, in turn, legitimated and enhanced provincial power. In the process, the powers of the provincial lieutenant governors came to match the breadth of provincial jurisdiction and, as a result, Canadian federalism as a system of compound monarchies was born.

Third, monarchy strengthens the political executive vis a vis the legislature and the people. Part of the explanation for the concentration of power that lies in the prime minister's hands can be found in the executive's exercise of the Crown prerogative. But it is also true that neither the prime minister, nor in the provinces the premiers, have any institutionalized responsibility for their dealings with the Crown. That relationship is based on convention. On this point about the Crown strengthening the political executive, it is useful to remember that American instruments of direct democracy failed to take root because their use in any obligatory or binding manner would compromise the integrity of the Crown.

The fourth influence of the Crown on how Canadians govern themselves is the one writers traditionally cite-its contribution to strengthening national unity. The Crown interprets the nation to itself. For much of Canadian history, governors general sought to reconcile English and French Canada. Today, they do this and much more.

Canada is a country defined by strong regionalism, linguistic duality and cultural pluralism. Its monarchy contributes to expressing these essential features. It fits Canada and the Canadian experience.

GOLDEN JUBILEE ROSE GARDEN

Two years ago two of our members of the Saskatchewan Branch began a process to create a rose garden at Crescent Park, Moose Jaw. They wanted to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of the Coronation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. They have been successful in gaining the support of the City of Moose Jaw in their project and, as a result, on 24 May John & Heather Morris look forward to planting 600 roses with the assistance of other Branch members and friends. The roses will be Canadian grown, nurtured by John Morris who is an enthusiastic gardener. Their goal is to complete their project in time for the visit of Prince Edward and his wife to Moose Jaw on Sunday, 22 June, as part of the city's Centennial celebrations. The rose bed will have a special plaque to commemorate the Queen's Golden Jubilee and the project is sponsored by the Saskatchewan Branch of the Monarchist League of Canada. The Branch is donating \$50.00 towards the cost of the plaque estimated at \$600.00 and inviting members to make a donation to this initiative by two of our members. Did You Know.. SOME FACTS ABOUT THE JUBILEE

Queen Elizabeth II, at the age of 76, is the oldest monarch to celebrate a Golden Jubilee. The youngest was the 51-year old James I.

The Queen has traveled more than 40,000 miles by air around the United Kingdom and the world during the jubilee.

During the jubilee the Queen has traveled on or been aboard: various kinds of airplanes, Sikorsky helicopter, Skyrail, golden bus, metro, Royal Train, steam train, aircraft carrier, minesweeper, royal barge, lifeboat, Gold State Coach, horse-drawn carriage, and various kinds of automobiles.

A PERSONAL NOTE

Alison Watson was honoured on her 75th birthday with a social on April 19 in Regina. Friends from various organizations shared in the celebration.

The Queen's Golden Jubilee Award for voluntary service groups was launched during 2002 to honour 'unsung heroes'. It will become an annual award.

The Queen made visits to all four main faith non-Christian faith communities in Britain (Sikh, Muslim, Jewish, Hindu) during the Jubilee. A multi-faith reception at Buckingham Palace was attended by more than 700 guests.

The Queen has delivered more than 20 speeches through the main jubilee period. She also received and replied to almost 17,500 congratulatory letters.
