Meetings of the Board of Directors

The Board of Directors for the South Saskatchewan Branch has met twice since the beginning of the year. Those at these meetings made final plans for the annual meeting of the branch, discussed for the Oueen's Birthday Luncheon, reviewed the budget for 2009, and discussed other aspects of the work of the branch. Also, there was consideration given to the work of the Monarchist League on the national level. It had been hoped that the Dominion Chairman, Robert Finch, would be able to visit the South Saskatchewan Branch, but circumstances prevent him from doing this at this time. One matter of concern was CBC's apparent lack of publicity on the time of the broadcast of the Queen's Christmas message; it was felt CBC should be encouraged to give that broadcast better publicity.

Meeting of the South Saskatchewan Branch

The first general meeting of the South Saskatchewan Branch of the League took place on Friday, March 20, at St. Mary's Anglican Church in Regina. During the meeting arrangements for the Queen's Birthday Luncheon were reviewed and consideration was given to possible fund raising projects.

Two motions were passed by the meeting. One established the Nominations Committee. The other proposed that a small percentage of the membership fee sent to the Dominion Office be rebated to the branches.

The program for the meeting was a talk by retired Brigadier-General Cliff Walker. He spoke on being in the service of the Queen in the military. He started his presentation with a moment of silence in memory of fallen soldiers. Isabel Bailey introduced General Walker, and Derek Nicholls expressed the thanks of the branch for his talk.

Notes of Talk by Brigadier-General Cliff Walker on In the Queen's Service

Given at the Branch meeting on March 20, 2009

General Walker, who has served in the military for thirty-five years, spoke of his contacts with members of the Royal Family. He met Prince Philip several times, including at the sod-turning for the war memorial; he sent the prince some pictures of that event. He spoke warmly of his meetings with Princess Ann, especially at the unveiling of the new plaque on the War Memorial at which time the princess took time to meet with families of fallen soldiers. General Walker was very impressed with how Princess Ann carried out her commitments.

People join the military for various including the wish reasons, adventure, the desire to challenge oneself, a sense of wanting to be part of a team, and an aim to fulfill the ideal to serve the country. The military receives various assignments, many of which are not true peace keeping. Peace keeping is maintaining a peace between groups who were at war, but want the fighting What the Canadians did in to stop. Cyprus was peace keeping. assignments involve peace enforcing of a peace that really does not exist, and peace making which is more of an undeclared war of police action. involvement in Korea was one such action taken to make peace. Now the action in Afghanistan is a de-facto war.

The Canadian military was involved in the Balkans when Yugoslavia was

breaking up as a nation and three groups, the Serbs, the Croats, and the Bosnians, where fighting among each other. The groups hated each other, and all were involved in atrocities. The Canadian forces were told to enforce a peace, but were given no clear mandate on dealing with attacks. In time lessons learned from this experience led to greatly strengthened mandates and directives in dealing with attacks and combat situations. Thus actions in Kuwait and Kossovo were carried out with very few casualties due to a greatly increased use of modern warfare.

In 2002 Canadian forces went to Afghanistan, but the objective and the nature of the enemy are somewhat unclear. Those in the insurgency will not fight in open engagement which they know they cannot win, so they aim to blow up the enemy one by one until they become exhausted and leave. Thus there seems to be no end to the fighting.

General Walker commented on what he thought could be future developments which he said he hoped would not happen. He saw the real possibility of an atomic detonation in the U.S. which could lead to an attack that would partially destroy Pakistan. This could provoke World War III in which Muslim countries would declare a holy war which they would lose. World War III would be a surgical war with agreements not to use weapons of mass destruction, but would shape the world.

Service in the military is being involved in the Queen's service. The problem of this service is with politicians who do not listen and seem not to understand what is involved in effective military operations.
