Chairman's Message

The end of 2004 brings us to the beginning of Saskatchewan's Centennial Year in 2005 and the many forms of celebration being planned across the Province in large and small communities. The growth of our Province from the days of the early pioneers and settlers has evolved into a part of Canada which has contributed much to our national profile through the years. Throughout our history we have been undergirded by the role of constitutional government and a deep respect for the monarchy. This will become more visible when Her Majesty the Queen and Prince Philip come to Saskatchewan in May 2005 to help us celebrate our Centennial Year.

Three significant events, amongst many, will mark the Centennial. First there is the new addition to historic Government House which is due to be completed by the end of December 2004. The Lt.Governor will hold her Annual Levee in the new addition on 1 January 2005. Second is the equestrian statue of The Queen seated on her favourite horse Burmese (Saskatchewan born and raised), to be unveiled by Her Majesty during her visit to Regina. Third is the creation of a special Centennial Medal to recognise the contribution of many people in the Province through the years. In each of these events members of the Monarchist League will be able to participate and show their support for the Province which we love as its citizens.

For our Branch of the Monarchist League we begin 2005 with the Annual Meeting on Friday, 28th January at St.Mary's Anglican Church, Regina, beginning at 7.00pm. The Nominations Committee has actively solicited a new Executive and Board of Directors to guide the Branch in 2005/2006. I have indicated my willingness to continue one more year as Branch Chairman but feel that after completing 9 years it is time for someone new to take the helm. Part of my reasons for continuing for the year is the impending royal visit and the completion of the equestrian statue project.

I am pleased to say that we have developed another series of good programmes for 2005 which are featured elesewhere in this Newsletter. Also we are embarking on the creation of a new *Branch Website* which will give us a new profile in the Province and across Canada. In May we are planning for 100 people to share the Annual Queen's Birthday/Centennial Luncheon. I hope that we will all mark Saturday 21 May with a circle on our calendars and plan to attend. Family and friends are a scource of numbers, too.

As this edition of the Newsletter will appear over Christmastide and New Year I wish you all a very happy Christmas and an encouraging New Year. GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

GOVERNMENT HOUSE PAST-PRESENTFUTURE

Ray Plosker and Loyd Begley from the Government House Historical Society spoke to the meeting of the South Saskatchewan Branch on Friday, October 15. The meeting took place at Government House. Following the meeting those present were able to go on a tour of the house.

Government House opened in 1891. Located two and a half miles from Regina, it was the fifth residence of the Lieutenant-Governor of the North West Territories. Up to that time the government house was quite inadequate.

Landscaping of the grounds of Government House started the same year the house was opened. George Watt was recruited to work on the grounds which totaled fifty-three acres. Mr. Watt eventually became the provincial horticulturalist.

In 1913 there was some thought to building a new government house, but this was not done. Government House had additions built on it, including the Ball Room and the Conservatory.

When Saskatchewan became a province, Government House continued to be the residence of the Lieutenant-Governor of Saskatchewan until 1945. The Lieutenant-Governor's residence was moved to the Hotel Saskatchewan.

After Government House was closed as the residence of the Lieutenant-Governor, the building was given various uses. Many of the items in the house were sold or moved to other places.

By 1976 Government House was getting in such poor condition that there was thought given to demolishing it. However the building was saved and restored. In 1984 the office of the Lieutenant-Governor was moved back to Government House. Much of Government House is a museum. It is a heritage property that is a monument to the Canadian Monarchy and the role of the Crown in the West.

Much of what had been in Government House has been returned or recovered. Part of the mandate of Government House is to preserve these items and their history. Government House carries out a variety of programs and has many visitors.

At this time work is being done to further improve the facilities and grounds of Government House, This is a Centennial Project. The work is based on a report prepared during 1999-2000. It is being done in three phases.

One of the important parts of the planned improvements involves the building of a new visitors center. This will house an interpretative center, displays, and administration offices.

Another part of planned improvements includes restoring the grounds to be more as George Watt designed them. While much of the original fifty-three acres that once made

up the grounds of Government House was sold, the nine acres that remain include the original garden. At one time the grounds were an expanse of fields and included a vegetable garden. As the city expanded much of the original grounds were sold for city uses.

There will be further additions to increase the facilities and to provide a new kitchen for the hospitality functions of the Ball Room. The additions and new facilities are planned so they are consistent with the architectural style of Government House.

Princess Ann dedicated the corner stone of the additions. Several provinces have no government houses. In five provinces the Lieutenant-Governor lives in the provincial Government House. Saskatchewan is the only province in which Government House is a museum.
