On this visit she will be invited to formally unveil the newly-created equestrian statue of herself riding Burmese her favourite horse, a gift from the RCMP. Parking is available in the public parking lot off Dewdney Avenue on the east side of Government House.

#### Government House was...

Built in 1891, this magnificent mansion served as the home of the Lieutenant Governors of the Northwest Territories, a vast area coverning over two-thirds of present day Canada, including the present day provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. From 1905, when the province of Saskatchewan was established, to 1945, the house was the official residence of the Lieutenant Governors of Saskatchewan.

Today Government House, Regina's oldest residence, is an impressive, lavishly decorated 14-room museum and National Historic Site. Government House offers public tours, a variety of educational programs, and a unique hospitality facility to various organizations. In addition it houses the

working offices of Saskatchewan's Lieutenant Governor.

Now a new addition to the existing structure is being built to enhance the potential and capacity of Government House. The addition will house an Interpretive Gallery, Visitor and Administrative Centre, Gift Shop, and a coach house to house the provincial horse-drawn landau and cutter. Also, the gardens and grounds of Government House are being restored to the original Edwardian design of around 1905.

# Queen's Jubilee Statue Project

Progress continues to be made on the statue of Queen Elizabeth on her favorite horse, Burmese. This statue will be in the grounds of the Legislative Assembly Building in Regina. Donations for this project continue to be most welcomed. The horse, Burmese, was born at Fort Walsh, Saskatchewan in 1962. By 1967 she was the leading horse for the Musical Ride. Burmese was given to Queen Elizabeth in 1969. The Queen rode Burmese for the Trooping of the Colour Parade, other ceremonial events, and for pleasure until she was retired in 1987.

# NEWS OF THE NORTH SASKATCHEWAN BRANCH

The North Saskatchewan Branch of the Monarchist League held its first meeting on April 14 with about thirty people attending, half of which were existing members. The Dominion Chairman, John Aimers, who was the main speaker, welcomed and encouraged those who attended the meeting. Nigel Molaro was named Chairman of the Branch. He spoke to the colourful projects that awaited the Branch in the first stretch of its initiatives in the region. Shaw TV News and The Star Phoenix afterwards aired a published feature on the inauguration that took place in Saskatoon.

On June 1, 2004, members of the North Saskatchewan Branch attended the official opening of the Diefenbaker Canada Centre's newest exhibit at the University of Saskatchewan, Happy and Glorious: The Royal Presence in Canada. Her Honour, The Hon. Dr. Lynda M. Haverstock launched the project that would welcome children to educational workshops about Canada's Monarchy. The event also marked the unveiling of the Raymon Hnatyshyn commemorative stamp.

Young monarchists from Saskatoon traveled to visit members in the western region of the Branch on August 5, 2004. They also made known the League's cause in new communities. The road tour made stops, among other places, in North Battleford, Edam, Meota, Mervin, and Waseca.

The new branch hosted members of Saskatoon's community at a summer reception on August 10 to promote the new presence and purpose of the North League in Monarchist Saskatchewan. Guests were joined by The Hon. P. Myron Kowalsky, Speaker Legislative Assembly of the Saskatchewan, and Mr. George E. Lafond, Special Adviser on Aboriginal University Initiatives at the Saskatchewan.

# ANNUAL QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY LUNCHEON

The South Saskatchewan Branch of the Monarchist League held its annual Birthday Luncheon Oueen's Saturday, May 22, 2004, at the Hotel Saskatchewan in Regina, starting at 12:00 noon. The programme of activities opened with the singing of, O Canada. The Rev. Derek Nicholls, Chairman of Saskatchewan South the welcomed all who had come and paid tribute in memory of deceased members, John Archer, Ada Bird, Hilda Bigelow, and Mary Budd. He also introduced table guests. Among those introduced at the luncheon was Heather Salloum, the new Private Secretary and Director of the Office of the Lieutenant Governor. Heather earned a Bachelor of Arts in English and Psychology and a Bachelor of Education in Secondary English at the University of Regina, and earned a Master if Arts at Carleton University. She brings tremendous experience to her new position as an educator, administrator, and active volunteer.

Derek Nicholls also read a number of regrets. Some of these included Ann Cheetham, Irene White, Lynn Gildman, Victoria Whitmore, Joan Finn, David and Margaret Morrey, Nigel Molaro, the Chairman of the North Saskatchewan Branch, and the Hon. P. Myron Kowalsky, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and an ardent monarchist. After Raymond Mynett led in the Grace, those present enjoyed a buffet luncheon. The Loyal Toast was presented by Mr. Keith Inches.

After the luncheon Derek Nicholls, the Branch Chairman, spoke about branch concerns and coming events. He recognizing certificate showed donations given by Monarchist League members to the Queen's Jubilee Statue Project, which totaled \$15,300.00. He also showed a silk scarf with a portrait of the Queen which a friend had given to them along with a copy of the video, A Queen in Crowned. Derek Nicholls noted that we celebrate the official birthday of Oueen Elizabeth who is 78 years old and is still giving strong leadership and is setting an example of dedicated service. He noted that we live in a constitutional monarchy recognized the role of the Queen in this.

Derek Nicholls spoke about developments in the organization of the Monarchist League in Saskatchewan. At one time there were two branches in the province. However the two branches were combined into one branch, the Saskatchewan Branch after the northern branch had some problems. This northern branch was re-activated on April 14 in Saskatoon. Thus there are

again two branches of the Monarchist League in Saskatchewan, the North Saskatchewan Branch and the South Saskatchewan Branch. The South Saskatchewan Branch would now be able to concentrate its efforts in the southern part of the province. The branch is looking to expand its membership with people of all ages. Derek Nicholls invited people to let him know if they found any interest in the Monarchist League so this could be followed up.

Derek Nicholls announced two coming events. These included the bus tour to Assiniboia, and the program at Government House on October 15. He also noted that 2005 was the centennial of Saskatchewan. It was anticipated that the Queen would be coming to the province as part of the celebrations. Members were invited to consider what would be done for the birthday luncheon in 2005 which will be on May 21.

Michael Jackson spoke about the program for the tour of Princess Anne, the Princess Royal, who would be in Saskatchewan for three days on a working visit. The Princess Royal is the hardest working member of the Royal Family who likes to be kept busy. The very full program for her visit reflects this wish. She would be flying to Canada and returning to London on a commercial flight.

Long-time member, Eileen Bancroft, put in a brief appearance at the luncheon. She was celebrating her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday on May 24, and would be guest of honour at a social to celebrate this birthday later in the afternoon of May 22. After the luncheon a number of members of the Monarchist League went to the birthday social at which Derek and Margaret took part in the program.

At the end of the program there was a draw for the raffle on a spoon. The raffle earned \$55.00. Also, there was an announcement on the roses for sale. John and Heather Morris had donated roses to be sold to raise money for the South Saskatchewan Branch.

The program for the luncheon closed with the singing of, God Save the Queen.

# BUS TOUR TO ASSINIBOIA

Members of the South Saskatchewan Branch of the Monarchist League joined with members of the Royal Society of St. George for a tour to Assiniboia, Saskatchewan. Raymond Mynett welcomed those on the bus when they arrived at the Prince of Wales Centre in Assiniboia. They were joined by League members from the local area.

Prince Charles, for whom the centre was named, had turned the sod for the centre. The afternoon concluded with a tour of Assiniboia conducted by Raymond Mynett and a visit to the museum.

# Visit of The Princess Royal

Her Royal Highness, The Princess Royal visited Saskatchewan from June 4<sup>th</sup> to June 7<sup>th</sup>.

As is her custom, the Princess Royal maintained an extremely busy schedule. On June 6th alone, she attended a D-Day Church Service for the Royal Regina Rifles, unveiled a D-Day Anniversary postage stamp, attended a reception hosted by Veterans Affairs Canada, received an honorary degree unveiled a plaque at the University of Regina, visited the Regina Palliative Care Unit, unveiled the cornerstone for Government House Centennial Addition, celebrated the Regina Humane 40<sup>th</sup> Society's Anniversary concluded the day at a dinner hosted by Their Honours at Government House.

Chief Justice E.D. Bayda acted as the Master of Ceremonies for the dinner in the historic ballroom, author Yann Martel offered a blessing, artist Yvette Moore proposed the Loyal Toast, La Raquette a claquettes provided upbeat French Canadian entertainment, and the Ken Jefferson Trio set a jazzy mood.

The Princess Royal was as busy on the other days she was in Saskatchewan. June 5 was the main focus of her visit, the celebration of the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the D-Day Landing with the Royal Regina Regiment of which she is Colonial-in-Chief. Her Royal Highness also attended the Speaker's Tea, fulfilled several private engagements, including Therapeutic Riding to the one Association of which she is patron, and Dinner with D-Day attended representatives of regiments of which she is Colonial-in-Chief.

On June 7 the Princess Royal went to Saskatoon and North Battleford where she took part in various events, including an aboriginal event. Then she flew to Toronto for a full day of various activities including a Monarchist League luncheon with a youth emphasis.

# **Royal Weddings**

The spring of 2004 was marked by some important weddings of royal heirs. Crown Prince Frederik of Denmark married Mary Donaldson on May 14. This was the first wedding of a Danish crown prince since 1743. The wedding was attended by Kings and Queens of Sweden, Norway, Greece, Spain, the Netherlands, and a number of princes and princesses. The Earl and Countess of Wessex represented the House of Windsor.

Crown Prince Felipe of Spain married Letizia Ortiz Rocasolano on May 22. Wedding guests included representatives of about thirty royal houses, the cream of Spanish society and a number of international figures such as Nelson Mandela. Prince Charles was among the guests at this wedding.

The marriage of Crown Prince Hamzah of Jordan and Princess Noor Hamzah was celebrated on May 27. This celebration was attended by nearly 2,000 guests. The Duke of York represented the Queen at the celebration. Other royal guests included representatives of the Spanish, Swedish, and Norwegian royal families.

A wedding of a member of the Windsors was of interest, although it was a quiet event. Lady Davina Windsor, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester, married Gary Lewis who is a Maori from New Zealand.

# Did you know...

The Federation of Malaya is a monarchy with something difference. The head of the federation is a king who is elected. He is chosen every five years through a secret ballot by the Council of Rulers from the nine states which make up Malaysia. The present king, Tuanku Syed Sirajuddin Ibni Al-Marhum Tuanku Syed Putra Jamalullail, was installed as the Supreme Head of the Federation in April, 2002. The Queen, Tuanku Fauziah Binti Al-Marhum Tengku Abdul Rashid, has proved to be very popular and is known as, "The People's Queen."

# **Other Royal Activities**

The King of Bahrain called on all nations to allow full freedom of worship and urged Muslim and Christian clergymen to work for peaceful coexistence. He also strongly condemned acts of terrorism, which he said conflicted with the principles of all religions. The king was in London where he met the Queen and Prime Minister Tony Blair

His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, Honorary President of the Royal Academy Trust, has officially opened the John Madejski Fine Rooms at the Royal Academy of Arts. Restored to its former Neo-Palladian glory, the Fine Rooms contain displays of works from the Academy's collections.

#### Honours and Awards

Executive Director of Protocol and Government House, Michael Jackson, explains that honours provide official recognition of citizens by the people through their head of state - in Canada's The Oueen. case. Honours, international custom, entitle the recipients to wear the "insignia" (usually medals on a ribbon). Awards are a form of recognition that can be given by any organization, including governments, and may take the form of certificates, trophies, plaques, lapel pins sometimes medals.
